


Construction of Station 51/Phase II

Twenty years ago, the District set out to build a new Station 51 on Zier Rd. The station was to include ^a administrative offices, a training center, and new station quarters for our members. The project was put on hold several times which led to price increases on the whole project. From the concept in 1999 to actual construction in 2005 the project cost rose to the point we could no longer afford the entire project. Fast forward fifteen years and our Admin/Training Center has now become home to 30 on-call members at Station 51 with very limited • space due to never building the actual fire station part of the project. Through strategic planning we identified

Phase II, the fire station part of the project as a priority for recruitment and retention of members. Upon completion of paying off the original bond in 2019 we hired KDA Architects of Yakima to • design Phase II. The design and bid process is complete and the • project has been awarded to TW Clark Construction out of Spokane. They quickly mobilized and have begun construction with plans to complete the project by mid-January. In an effort to build a fire station for 20-30 years into the future, Phase II includes a day room, • four apparatus bays, four individual restrooms with showers, four offices that can be converted to dorms if needed and a workout center to serve all members of the District. The health and safety of our

members is an important factor in the design of the new station. We are • constructing the station following the latest guidelines to reduce health



be paid back from our general fund the same way we paid for Phase I without requesting additional tax dollars. Look forward to completion of the Station and are hoping to hold an Open House in Spring of 2021 if recommended health guidelines can be met.

Did you know that the West Valley Fire Department is predominately funded by property tax dollars? In 2020 your property tax valuation

included \$1.27 per thousand dollars assessed for the Fire District. The rate per thousand changes annually based on the valuation of all properties within our District. A voter approved EMS levy that equate to \$.21



per thousand in 2020 also contributes to our annual budget. The EMS levy funds can only be used for emergency medical services, such as supplies and manpower to deliver such services. Property taxes make up approximately 95% of our annual budget, the remainder comes from grants, fire protection services (such as wildland project fires), and donations. LET'S KIEEP THEM SA

New car seats laws in Washington State went into effect on January 2020.

- Children up to age 2 must ride in a rear-facing car seat.
- Children ages 2 to 4 years **must** ride in a car seat with a harness (rear or forwarding facing).
- Children 4 years and older must ride in a car or booster seat until they are 4'9" tall.
- Children up to age 13 **must** ride in the back seat when practical.

Remember a child restraint system must be used according to the instructions of the vehicle and child restraint manufacturer. The manuals are great resources for installation information. Unfortunately, in the wake of
